## **Thanksgiving**

In case you're wondering, Thanksgiving is the peak day for home cooking fires. The day has three times the average number of reported home fires involved with cooking equipment. Please be careful this holiday season. The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) discourages the use of outdoor, gas-fueled turkey fryers, which can lead to devastating burns, destruction of property, and other injuries. Additionally, Underwriters Laboratories (UL), the organization that certifies safe products, does not certify these types of fryers with its UL label.

**Both organizations discourage the use of open-flame fryers due to the following:**

- Turkey fryers tip easily, spilling their contents, and causing oil to ignite.
- Overfilling the fryer is common. The oil spills out of the pot when the turkey is placed in the fryer, engulfing the whole unit in flames.
- With no thermostat controls, the oil is prone to overheating to the combustion point. The handles and lid get extremely hot, which can cause severe burns.
- Since the unit is designed for outdoor use, rain or snow can fall on the unit, splattering the oil and converting the water to scalding steam.

**Despite these hazards, if you still plan on using a turkey fryer, please follow these safety guidelines:**

- Always use the fryer outdoors on a flat surface, safely away from structures, wooden decks, and covered patios. No matter what, **DO NOT** be tempted to use the fryer in a garage.
- **Have the correct kind of fire extinguisher nearby and ready to use.**
- To ensure you are using the right amount of oil, place a thawed turkey in the fry pot and add enough water to cover the bird by ½". Remove the turkey and mark the water level. Dump the water and thoroughly dry the pot and turkey. Fill the pot with oil to the marked level.
- Do not leave the fryer unattended. Monitor the temperature of the oil with a thermometer to prevent the oil from overheating and catching fire. If the oil begins to smoke, immediately turn the gas off.
- Ensure the turkey is COMPLETELY THAWED to prevent a fire or explosion hazard.
- Raise and lower the turkey slowly to prevent oil splatter, burns, and fire.
- Keep children and pets away from the fryer to prevent tipping, even after the turkey is done. The oil is dangerously hot for hours.
- Use your safety tools: Oven mitts, gloves, and safety goggles.
- Stand upwind of the propane tank and fryer so heat blows away from you.

**Good news for the residents of West Liberty:**

East Newell Street from Washington Street to end in Cul-De-Sac will be milled and paved.

North Street from East Newell Street to Pickrelltown rd. will be milled and paved.

North Street from Pickrelltown Rd to Linden Street will be overlaid with asphalt.

Race Street from Pickrelltown Rd to Linden Street will be overlaid with asphalt.

This work will be completed in the summer of 2023.

***Just a reminder:***

**1)** Please do not put leaves in the street as they can be a traffic hazard and can also clog storm drains if it rains which can cause flooding. Leaves run over by traffic are also hard to pick up. It is against village Ordinances to place any debris in streets. Please place leaves as close as possible to the street but not in the street or in the gutter. If possible make long and narrow row instead of one large pile. □

**2)** Leaf piles raked close to or behind trees, mailboxes, sign posts, fire hydrants etc. can't be reached with the machine, so please avoid raking your piles near these items. If cars are parked in front of or close to leaf piles we cannot reach them and piles will not be picked up. Please park two car lengths away from leaf piles.

**3)** Sticks, yard waste, rocks, etc. placed in the leaf piles can clog or damage the machine. When this happens we have to take time to remove the blockage which sets us behind schedule.

**4)** Please do not rake trash, paper or other waste of any kind in with leaves as this is against EPA regulations.

We pick up leaves most days of the week. If your leaves aren't out when we go by your house it may be a week or longer before we get back as it takes time to cover the whole town when leaves are falling heavily. By following these guidelines we can pick up leaves faster and more efficiently. Leaf pickup usually ends around Thanksgiving as we have to get the trucks changed over for snow. As we get closer to the end of leaf season a call alert will go out with information about the last day of pickup. If you are not signed up for the free service or are not receiving alerts, contact Town Hall at 937-465-2716 to update your contact information.

It's hard to make it more exciting other than adding an exclamation, however, if you're one that enjoys solving puzzles a budget is, at least, challenging. The process begins in October, but doesn't really go into practice until around March the following year. This means the village needs to have a certain amount of money carried over from 2022 for 2023. It's not like we press a reset button in January and money gets deposited into our account for the whole year. Certain money from different sources comes in at different times of the year.

2020 was a hard year for everyone and West Liberty was able to weather the storm, because our clerk/treasurer knows the importance of a budget and protecting our bottom line. However, there are still things that have slowed our economy down. In 2020 employment tax went down due to many people being furloughed or laid off, gas tax income went down because people weren't driving to and from work, money coming to us from Logan County and the State decreased for the same reasons. It's hard to recover fully when your income is not back to the level it once was prior to a disaster (like Covid), but your municipality still requires things like continued maintenance to streets, water/sewer, parks, properties. Our Department supervisors are good about finding grants to help supplement their department projects when possible.

Let me take a minute to explain that Each Department (Street, Police, Fire, Water, Parks, Cemetery, Zoning) gets a budget projected for the year. They are not interchangeable. The Columbus Street repair project slated for spring of 2023 is part of the Street Dept. jurisdiction. The Columbus Street Bridge repair money is coming from other sources and headed by Jayne Griffith Bridge Committee. This is money that can't be spent other than for what it was intended.

It's easy to think all of the villages money gets put in one big pot and that is how it is spent, but that's not the case. I encourage you to sit and work out your own household budget for 2023 then ask 10 of your friends if you can do their budget, too. Your money gets spent on your budget and their money is spent on theirs and they're not interchangeable. Then you'll have a better idea of how village finances work.

The candy store is an original train depot which was built in 1926 and was originally located in the southwest corner of the village. They gave gifts of homemade candy to helpful friends and neighbors. Marie’s Candies officially opened its doors in 1956 and provided a living for the Kings. Husband and wife, Jay (son of Winfred and Marie) and Kathy King took ownership in 1977 and had the vision and creativity for the growth of Marie’s Candies. They dedicated their lives to improving candy production, increasing candy options, and designing candy gifts. They also moved and restored a train depot that became the business’s retail space in 1996. Brother and sister, Shannon King and Rebecca Craig (children of Jay & Kathy) became co-owners in 2016 and continue the legacy of their grandparents and parents.”

Rebecca’s favorite thing about owning a business in West Liberty, is being able to give back to the community who was such a big help to her grandparents. We enjoy supplying candy and prizes for Easter egg hunts, coloring contests, trick-or-treating, pictures with Santa, and more.


